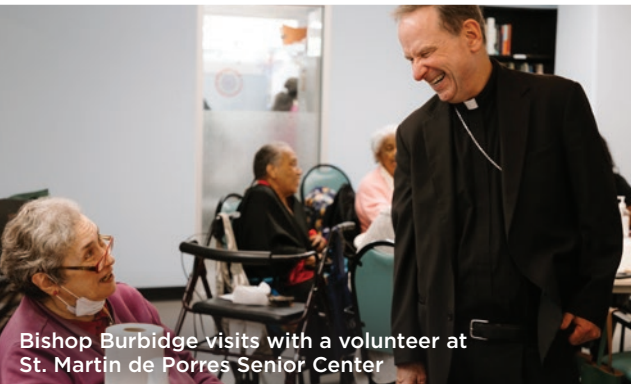

\$8.2 MILLION IN SUPPORT PROVIDED

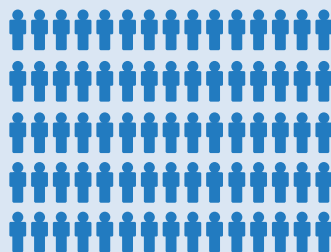

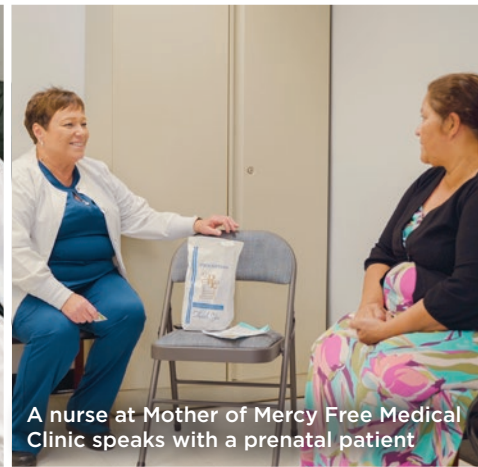

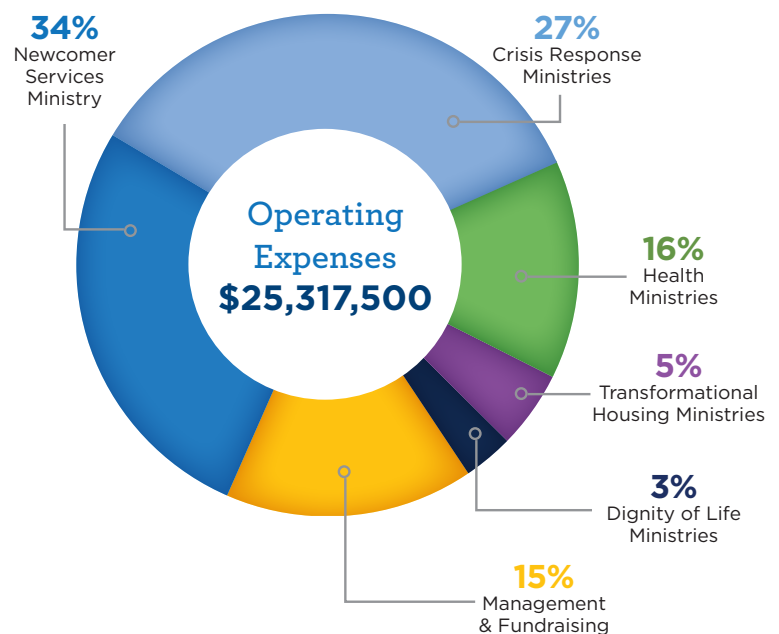
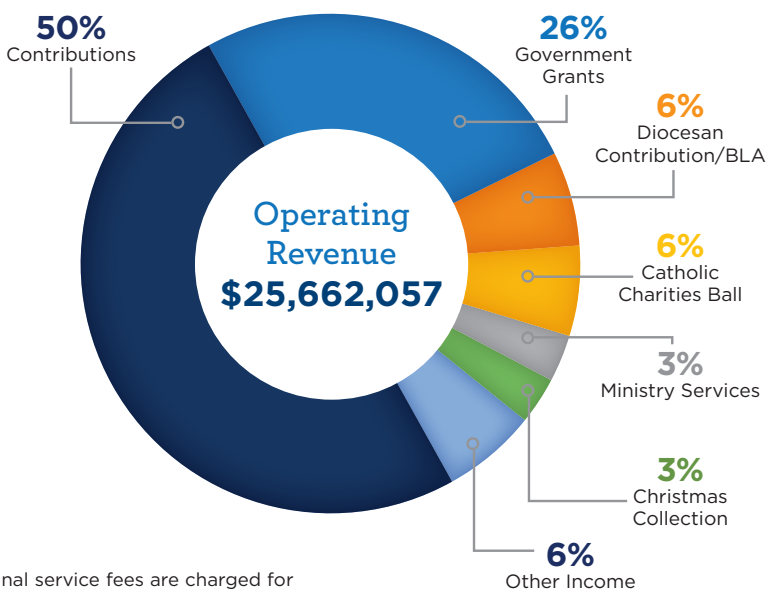
