"God chose Christ House for me"

PETER COULDN'T SEEM TO GET his life on the right path. First his mother died of COVID, then his stepfather died. Peter was diabetic, and he began to drink to numb his pain. He lost his job.

Peter needed a place where he could rebuild himself. His caseworker recommended Catholic Charities Christ House. He's now a resident there, finding the spiritual, emotional, and educational support to help him get on track. "It's brought me back. I've been sober for 42 days now, looking for jobs, and I'm very happy to be here," he says.

Catholic Charities Christ House is a transitional housing ministry that supports men in need of shelter, workforce development, and life skills training. Through job coaching, the residents receive assistance with writing a resume and practicing for interviews.

Peter praises the staff and volunteers for guiding the residents in many different ways. "They take time out of their busy schedule to really make sure my life improves, both in a spiritual way and in an economic way. Without them, it would be very difficult. I'm very lucky that they give their time freely to us."

Spiritual growth has also played an important role during Peter's time at Christ House. He credits the staff

Feeding hungry families during the holidays

URING THE WINTER MONTHS Catholic Charities works hard not only to provide food for hungry individuals and families throughout the diocese, but also to make sure neighbors have the festive foods that help make a Thanksgiving and Christmas holiday meal.

This couldn't be done without the help of our parishes and other partners, including Knights of Columbus councils around the diocese.

In Arlington, Our Lady Queen of Peace Catholic Church asked the St. Lucy Food Project for help picking up and storing 200 turkeys which the parish had purchased and planned to distribute prior to Thanksgiving. Catholic Charities will return the turkeys on distribution day and help pass them out from the back of its refrigerated truck.

In Clifton, the Knights of Columbus Council from St. Andrew and St. Clare of Assisi churches launched their annual food drive to collect all the food needed for a traditional Thanksgiving feast: frozen turkeys, gravy, vegetables, sweet potatoes, cranberry sauce, fruit, stuffing, instant mashed potatoes, rolls, cookies, and juice. The Knights typically collect and pack more than 100 meals which St. Lucy sends to its three pantries or other pantries throughout the diocese.

And at Catholic Charities Alexandria Food Pantry on Eisenhower Avenue we held our first ever drive-thru

distribution of almost 200 Thanksgiving dinners: turkey or halal chicken, and all the trimmings for a Thanksgiving feast.

In Front Royal, one generous friend donated almost 200 turkeys of various weights to our Loaves and Fishes Food Pantry to provide to those in need. St. Lucy will continue feeding hungry families for the holiday and beyond. †

Catholic Charities gives patients a dose of love and special attention

POR THE SECOND STRAIGHT YEAR, Catholic Charities Mother of Mercy Free Medical Clinics stretched beyond health care to offer TLC - tender, loving care - to about 800 patients or their family members on Sept. 21.

Patient Appreciation Day was held at Mother of Mercy's Woodbridge clinic on a picture-perfect Saturday with more than 60 volunteers from Our Lady of Angels Catholic Church, All Saints Catholic Church, the Cursillo and Emmaus movements, as well as

family members of staff. They worked the grills and food tables, bounce house, face painting and raffle ticket stations, and gave haircuts and manicures.

Catholic Charities St. Lucy Food Project provided 100 bags of food for patients. Generous donors provided a wealth of prizes, including TVs, tablets, cooking and other kitchen items, jewelry, paintings, and more.

"Bishop Burbidge calls us to a 'radical solidarity' with the people entrusted to our care," said Catholic Charities President and CEO Stephen Carattini. "Days like this where people are offered the opportunity to be celebrated, to be recognized, and to be appreciated are an important part of our ministry at Catholic Charities."

"Many of our patients and their families cannot afford professional services like photography, haircuts, facials, and makeup," said Clinic Director Alexandra Luevano. She said one couple, a husband and wife both dealing with complex medical issues, said how refreshing the day was for them.
